With Michaelmas rowing the past two years being defined by a near-constant state of river closures, it is fair to say that the river gods blessed us this past term. This ability to get novices out rowing on the water undoubtedly contributed to a record novice recruitment on the women's side! Our recruitment drive began at the fresher's week BBQs, with over 25 sign-ups for a taster session at each of the MCR and JCR BBQs. It seems novices must have enjoyed these, as numbers translated into big turnouts at ergs (20+ seen each Tuesday!), as well as crew runs and regular outings - with each week seeing a minimum of three completely different novice eights going out. This recruitment success led to us entering two women novice eights into the Tamesis Novice Regatta, for the first time ever! These crews did Hilda's proud, with both winning their first race, and our 'A' crew progressing through to the

knockouts on Saturday. As well as all our lovely new novices, we have had another very exciting recruit this year: our new women's coach, Megan Culbert. We can't wait to see the new heights she leads the women's side to in the coming terms! On the senior front, we are lucky enough to have retained the majority of our seniors from 2024/25, with their willingness and enthusiasm facilitating the training of so many novices. Seniors also got together a scratch crew and raced in IWL A, putting on a strong showing to finish comfortably in the top half of competitors, an

We decided to thank Christ Church appropriately by bowballing them before the end of the start sequence. Friday rolled in

with another crushing victory over Keble A, before a tough draw against Magdalen A, the overall winners, meant we had to retire at the round of 16: a fabulous achievement, and one about which we were all very proud!

In the spirit of winning, the seniors have also followed suit this term. Two competitive 4+

boats have been fielded this term in both IWL A and Autumn Fours, with the M4+A

posting the fastest time for a 4 in IWL A, beating many eights, and the affectionately

named 'Physics 4' exhibiting some strong rowing in both competitions. Things are looking bright for the coming terms. Great work boys!
